The Senate voted to require the board to give the Legislature one year of intentions to close a facility. The board decided to eliminate the program, the trustees of that institution could oppose the closing and the board would then have to prove the closing by a two-thirds vote.

One House amendment that would have created two separate boards, one for the University of Connecticut and the other to oversee state's four-year colleges and technical and community colleges. The University of Connecticut pushed for the amendment.

"A single board of regents for this size would be the optimal," said Rep. Irving Stolberg, D-New Haven, former professor at Southern Connecticut State College.

Another would have added six members to the proposed 11-member board to include representatives from various institutions.

Rep. Martin Looney, D-New Haven, said the proposed organization would lead to "confrontation, rather than cooperation" between the institution and the board.
